**Chandak Ghosh, M.D., M.P.H.****HRSA****Monday, September 19****8:30 AM—9:30 AM*****HRSA's Commitment to Rural Health***

A board-certified ophthalmologist, Dr. Ghosh is currently with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA). His work led to the development of HRSA's National Performance Review Protocol, utilized to improve all Federal health grantees, including hospitals, universities, and community health centers.

He is also a practicing eye surgeon, seeing patients and training residents in New York City.

Dr. Ghosh stands committed to the health needs of underserved populations and keeps focus on the impact of economic downsizing on quality of care. He has authored numerous landmark publications and research presentations, including the most recent, "A National Health Agenda for Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders" (JAMA), which has garnered national recognition. His articles' findings have been presented before Congress and the White House and have energized collaborations among foundations, community-based groups, government, and academia. Other areas of research concentration include health communication and literacy, uninsured elderly, quality measurement, and ocular disease in diabetes.

After his undergraduate studies at Yale, Dr. Ghosh received his medical degree from the Medical College of Virginia and completed a chief residency in ophthalmology at Long Island Jewish Hospital/Albert Einstein College of Medicine. He served as a Commonwealth Fund Fellow in Minority Health Policy and received a Masters in Public Health from Harvard University, School of Public Health. The U.S. Public Health Service has awarded Dr. Ghosh a rare two Outstanding Service Medals, among its highest honors, for "groundbreaking policy research of national significance."

**Nirav Shah, M.D., M.P.H.****Commissioner of Health
New York State****Department of Health****Tuesday, September 20****11:30 AM—12:30 PM*****The Future of Rural Health Care***

Nirav R. Shah, M.D., M.P.H., is the 15th New York State Commissioner of Health. His nomination by Governor Andrew M. Cuomo was confirmed by the State Senate on January 24, 2011, making him the first Indian-American to serve as State Commissioner of Health as well as the youngest person named to the post. An expert in the use of systems-based methods to improve patient outcomes, Dr. Shah has been a leading researcher in the use of large-scale clinical

laboratories and electronic health records to improve the effectiveness and efficiency of care. He is a nationally recognized thought leader in the methods needed to transition to lower-cost, patient-centered health care for the 21st century. His vision for New York is a state where every resident has access to affordable health insurance coverage, high quality care, and early screening and other services to prevent chronic disease and improve overall health.

A native of Buffalo, Dr. Shah is an honors graduate of Harvard College and received his medical degree and master's degree in public health from the Yale School of Medicine. He was a Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholar at UCLA and a National Research Service Award Fellow at New York University. Dr. Shah is a fellow of American College of Physicians and the New York Academy of Medicine. He has served on the editorial boards of medical journals, has published more than 90 peer-reviewed articles, and has received more than \$4.5 million in research funding. He is certified in internal medicine by the American Board of Internal Medicine.

These initiatives have proven to reduce costs and improve efficiencies, while continuing to provide quality services to Chemung County citizens. <p>Building a Medical Home in the Adirondacks</p> <p>How does a small medical community sharpen its focus to meet the formidable challenges in today’s health care world? Adirondack Medical Center and the physicians of the Tri-Lakes Region have embraced the patient-centered medical home as their vehicle for change. The concept of patient centered medical home continues to evolve, but the question of sustainability threatens to derail the process. The Adirondack Regional Medical Home Pilot Project answers the financial uncertainties of change by engaging practices, hospitals and insurers in an active partnership. Participants will discover how a patient-centered medical home can transform care management.</p> <p>Presenter: Mary Welch, BS Tri-Lakes Medical Home Administrator Elizabeth Buck, MD Adirondack Medical Center</p>	<p>The Empire State Public Health Training Center (ESPHTC): Enhancing the Rural Health Workforce Performance Using Distance Learning Technology</p> <p>Attendees will learn how the Rural Health Training Project of the ESPHTC supports the training needs of the rural public health infrastructure in NYS, particularly in medically underserved areas, such as rural communities through the use of technology and distance learning. This presentation discusses how the ESPHTC incorporates innovative web based distance learning opportunities for the rural public health workforce to engage in lifelong learning through short courses, certificate programs and continuing education credit programs. This was seen as an interim step to improve care across settings as we continue to develop a Community Care Management program as part of a Patient-Centered Medical Home. This session will discuss a “big-picture approach” to preventative health through diverse community partnerships and comprehensive needs analysis. Girls on the Run is an experiential learning program combining 5K with lessons that encourage positive emotional, social, mental, spiritual and physical development. The mission is to educate and prepare girls for a lifetime of self-respect and healthy living. Short-term goals include enhanced self-esteem, increased physical activity, and healthier nutritional choices. <p>Teambuilding 101</p> <p>At the end of this session participants will learn the basics in teambuilding. The session will teach: the three essential elements in building a team and what happens when these elements are missing. The session will teach what “teamkillers” are and how to prevent them. Participants will learn the 5R’s and how to apply them. The session will also teach participants the Betari Model and how to apply it to teambuilding. GAP emphasizes individualized patient-centered care, focusing on patients identified with geriatric syndromes. The presenters discuss patient, community, and system impact of this model program, as well as lessons learned and future issues. Suicide is regarded as a serious public health or mental health problem. This program challenges the participants to break a long standing tradition of avoiding the community health consequences of suicide. We will conduct awareness exercises, asking about suicide, exploring life sustaining resources, and explore suicide prevention activities. These activities will be conducted with safety in mind as the exploration of suicide can be challenging in many way.
